What's New at Sessions Woods

In late winter, Lamothe's Sugar House of Burlington leased taps on sugar maple trees at the Sessions Woods Wildlife Management Area in a location off East Chippens Hill Road. CT Department of Energy & Environmental Protection forester David Irvin oversaw the lease of the taps through a Forest Products Harvesting Permit that allows a set number of taps in an area. The CT DEEP Forestry guidelines allowed 1 tap per tree, 12-16 inches in diameter at breast height (DBH) and no more than 2 taps on a tree 18 inches or more in DBH.

Allowing maple sap harvesting is an example of the use of a renewable natural resource and an opportunity to support local Connecticut-grown products. Connecticut's sugar maple industry only produces 10 percent of the sugar maple syrup that Connecticut citizens consume.

Be Bear Aware!

By the time you receive this newsletter, our Connecticut bears will have left their winter den sites and be foraging for food to replenish the body fat they lost over winter. Now is the time to become reacquainted with the 7 tips recommended by the CT DEEP Wildlife Division to prevent problems with bears!

#1 Never feed bears! Bears that associate food with people may become bold and possibly cause property damage.

#2 Remove bird feeders. Bears will eat seed that is easily available.

#3 Clean grills after use.

#4 Do not leave pet food outside.

#5 Store livestock food in airtight containers.

#6 Do not add meat or sweets to compost.

#7 Store garbage safely- Keep trash bags in a container with a tight lid and store in a garage or a shed until collection morning.
